



I. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Building on our pioneering training series for activists, lawyers, social workers and educators, *Empowering Girls and Young Women at Risk* has been fully integrated into our Morocco programming. With the generous support of the British Embassy, Rabat, the Law Group Morocco team began implementing our long-term vision for empowering girls and young women at risk by conducting the first-ever national campaign against the sexual abuse, forced labor and trafficking of girls and young women in prostitution and domestic service.

During the reporting period 01 November 2002 – 31 March 2003 under a grant from the British Embassy, Rabat, the Law Group Morocco team:

- United 20 members of 13 human and women's rights NGOs and local development associations from diverse regions across Morocco in a *Girls and Young Women at Risk Working Group* to plan and carry out the a national public awareness campaign;
- Implemented a *National Month of Awareness Campaign* in March 2003 featuring public information and awareness-raising activities, prevention programs, direct service provision, legal orientation and human rights advocacy in strategic sites across the country; and
- Produced and distributed a 375-page Arabic language resource publication, *Empowering Girls and Young Women at Risk in Morocco: A Resource Book on Sexual Abuse, Forced Labor and Human Trafficking in Prostitution and Domestic Service*.

The broad reach of our Month of Awareness Campaign broke new ground for the protection of girls and young women at risk in Morocco and received, along with our resource publication, very positive responses from local authorities and coverage by several local print and broadcast media outlets. The Morocco section of the Law Group's website (www.hrlawgroup.org/country_programs/Morocco) featured French and English descriptions of the Month of Awareness Campaign and activities held by the participating organizations, as well as contact information for our 13 local partners. During March 2003, the campaign pages were visited more than 1,200 times and there was a surge in the number of visitors to the Morocco section in general.

In collaboration with its network of local partners in this Initiative, the Law Group is currently elaborating its 2-year strategy to build on this successful campaign and implement permanent programs of direct service and advocacy on behalf of girls and young women at risk in Morocco in organizations across the country.

II. EMPOWERING GIRLS AND YOUNG WOMEN AT RISK INITIATIVE

Our now long-term *Empowering Girls and Young Woman at Risk Initiative* evolved out of the pilot training program conducted from April through September 2002, made possible with the generous financial support of the Catholic Organization for Relief and Development (CORDAID) in the Netherlands. The Law Group Morocco team conducted progressive one-week trainings in strategic areas of the country over a six-month period, in collaboration with a Dutch social worker specializing in Moroccan girls and young women at risk in the Netherlands and the Director of the Law Group's Initiative in Trafficking in Persons managed through our headquarters in Washington, DC.

Through our trainings, and participant mentoring during the month of learning application between each module, our innovative capacity building prepared social workers, community educators, lawyers and human rights activists, from 10 women's rights organizations and local development associations, for conducting outreach to and counseling girls and young women at risk, as well as providing them with social and legal services and advocating on their behalf.

Now a long-term program, our *Empowering Girls and Young Women at Risk Initiative* focuses on assisting our local partners with developing sustainable programs of support and advocacy on behalf of girls and young women at risk in Morocco. Our Initiative objectives include:

- Strengthening the capacity and effectiveness of local women's NGOs to document instances of sexual abuse of girls and young women at risk, provide social, psychological and legal support, and advocate on their behalf;
- Initiating the development of specific programs within local NGOs targeting girls and young women at risk;
- Encouraging the integration of girls and young women at risk into the beneficiaries of existing programs at women's NGOs (i.e., literacy classes, health education, orientation and counselling for women victims of violence, and income-generating activities);
- Enhancing the protection of girls and young women at risk through strategic case management and local, national and international advocacy;
- Developing effective regional and national NGO networks committed to working together to empower girls and young women at risk;
- Linking local groups supporting girls and young women at risk to their international counterparts;
- Developing support groups and peer education programs within local NGOs;
- Establishing prevention activities though local schools, the media and community groups;
- Raising public awareness about girls and young women at risk in Morocco

To begin working toward achieving these goals, the Law Group Morocco team convened a Working Group of local partners who had participated in our pilot training series and, with them, planned and implemented the first-ever National Month of Awareness Campaign against the sexual abuse, forced labor and trafficking of girls and young women into prostitution and domestic service.

A. Creating the Girls and Young Women at Risk Working Group

In October 2002, the Law Group Morocco team created the *Girls and Young Women at Risk Working Group*, involving 20 members of 13 human and women's rights NGOs and local development associations from Tetouan, Tangiers, El Hajeb, Casablanca, Essaouira, Agadir, Fes, Marrakech, Azrou and Rabat. During the six weeks that followed, Working Group members prepared for the first collective strategy building meeting by determining the involvement of their respective organizations based on our detailed questionnaire designed to guide their intra-organizational garnering of commitment. The Law Group Morocco team convened the Working Group's first strategic planning meeting in December 2002.

At the strategy building meeting, we guided Working Group members in:

1. Determining the content and planning the production of the first-ever resource manual on girls and young women at risk, for use by Moroccan NGOs working with this target population; and
2. Designing and coordinating the first-ever public awareness campaign against the sexual abuse, forced labor and trafficking of girls and young women in prostitution and domestic service, to be orchestrated by Working Group members in the areas of Morocco at which their organizations are based.

Structure of the Working Group Strategy Building Meeting

Morning Session: Participants worked in small groups to identify the target population of the resource manual, define the objectives for producing the resource, and brainstorm priority topics, resources, documents and information to include in the publication. In plenary, participants reached consensus on the content and structure of the resource publication and each participant committed her organization to researching and writing a portion of the manual. (Please see "Section C" below for a description of the resource publication.)

Afternoon Session: Participants presented their respective organizations' proposals of activities for a Day of Awareness of Girls and Young Women at Risk. In small groups, participants then brainstormed other potential activities. The session concluded in plenary, during which participants reached consensus on a list of diverse action plan that included public information and awareness-raising activities, prevention programs, direct service provision to target beneficiaries, and human rights and legal advocacy initiatives. The Working Group decided to declare March 2003 the "National Month of Awareness", created a calendar of activities, and committed to closing out the campaign with book launch events at their respective sites promoting the resource publication.

In January and February, the Law Group Morocco team coordinated and edited members' contributions to the resource publication and assisted the 13 member organizations in honing and implementation their campaign activities. We also hosted activities in Rabat and elsewhere in partnership with our Community Liaisons.

B. Mobilizing Community Engagement through a National Month of Awareness Campaign

The first-ever National Month of Awareness Campaign reached target beneficiaries, local authorities and the general public well beyond the cities and small towns where the Working Group member organizations are based as several Law Group partners conducted intensive outreach to girls and young women in remote rural areas. Critical awareness was raised in the rural reaches of Fes, Agadir and Marrakech/Tansift El Haouz regions in particular.

The wide variety of activities offered the various communities targeted during the campaign are listed below by campaign site. (Please see the attached calendars of activities¹ for more details).

Month of Awareness Campaign Activities

El Hajeb (Middle Atlas Mountains)

Association Amal pour la femme et le développement (a local women's rights NGO) and *Association al Hadaf* (a local theatre group) wrote and produced the innovative theatre piece "Al Moghtassaboun" ("The Rapists"), the first of its kind in Morocco to address issues of sexual abuse, human trafficking and prostitution. The *Law Group Morocco team* assisted with integrating human rights concepts into the script, attended rehearsals and provided technical assistance during the production, and created supporting advocacy and publicity materials for the theatre piece, including posters, flyers, and programs. The *Law Group Morocco team* also created T-shirts for the theatre event — with the slogan "Look at me, Recognize my dignity, Respect my humanity" — that became the "uniform" worn by campaign participants at all events across the country.

The Law Group Morocco team facilitated further productions of the play in Tangiers, Tetouan, Marrakech and Casablanca during the Month of Awareness. As a result of the Month of Awareness, *Association Amal* and the theatre group were invited to repeat the production at University *Al Akhawayn* in Ifrane in April 2003.

March 8: Premiere of "Al Moghtassaboun": *Association Amal pour la femme et le développement*, *Association al Hadaf* and the *Law Group Morocco team* hosted the premiere of the theatre piece in El Hajeb on March 8 in honor of International Women's Day. More than 600 people attended the play. The Law Group Morocco team designed and staffed a women's human rights booth at the local cinema where the play was performed, featuring posters, brochures and informational resources. The production was followed by a silent candlelight protest outside on the street where the cinema is located, which leads to the red light district of El Hajeb. All Working Group members attended the premiere in support of *Association Amal*, a year-old organization receiving no financial support outside their Law Group sub-grant, and the very first women's organization to work in El Hajeb, a town known for forced brothel prostitution.

¹ Due to the outbreak of hostilities in Iraq and the resulting protests by students in Morocco, several activities were rescheduled for later dates different than those indicated in the attached calendars. No activities were cancelled.

Tangiers

Association Amna implemented the following activities during the Month of Awareness:

- **March 16: Theatre Production:** *Association Amna*, in collaboration with *Association Amal pour la femme et le développement* (El Hajeb) and *Association al Hadaf* (El Hajeb) presented the theatre piece “Al Moghtassaboun” (“The Rapists”) at the Cinema Dawliz in Tangiers. Due to extensive outreach by *Association Amna*, among the 350 people who attended the play were a group of commercial sex workers, members of local women’s development and cultural associations, local journalists, beneficiaries of local centers for women victims of violence, teachers and students from the *Institut national de l’action social* (the National Institute for Social Worker Training), high school students, hotel personnel, and domestic workers.
- **March 20: Human Rights Education Session:** *Association Amna* held a human rights education session for 15 commercial sex workers at the *Maison de la femme*, in partnership with a local psychologist. Participants viewed *Les fleurs du mal*, a television documentary produced by the Moroccan television station 2M on prostitution in Casablanca. The viewing was followed by a debate among participants about the documentary, an open question and answer period for the participants with the psychologist, and *Amna*’s introduction of the legal orientation and assistance the organization can provide participants.
- **March 21: Human Rights Education Session:** *Association Amna* held a human rights education session for students at the *Institut national de l’action social* (the National Institute for Social Worker Training), attended by 84 social work students. Fatima LAST NAME, a Law Group Community Liaison, facilitated the session. Participants viewed *L’histoire de Khadija Bahi*, a television documentary produced by the Moroccan television station 2M on trafficking into forced prostitution in El Hajeb. The viewing was followed by a presentation and discussion on women’s human rights, violence against women, and the causes and consequences of prostitution in Morocco.
- **March 31: Open House for Resource Publication:** *Association Amna*, in collaboration with the *Maison communautaire de la femme* and *Association Darna*, organized a presentation and distribution of *Empowering Girls and Young Women at Risk*, the developed by the Law Group Morocco team and members of the Working Group. The event was attended by members of local women’s organizations, political party representatives, social workers, students, and journalists from the local press.

Marrakech

The Law Group Community Liaison in Marrakech, Halima Oulami, implemented the following activities before and during the Month of Awareness:

- **February 7: Preparatory Meeting:** Ms. Oulami convened a meeting with 21 representatives from 20 local organizations to introduce the Month of Awareness, establish a local network for implementation campaign activities, and create a calendar of campaign events.
- **March 1: Book Presentation and Discussion:** In collaboration with the *Club de livre et de lecture*, Ms. Oulami organized a presentation and discussion with author Fatima Ezriouil about her book *La prostitution*. The author spoke about her book, the outreach, fieldwork and interviews she conducted to write it, and the economic,

social, psychological and legal issues facing prostitutes. The event was attended by 96 girls and young women including high school students and beneficiaries of the legal literacy program, and members of local associations.

- **March 2: Human Rights Education Session:** Ms. Oulami held a human rights education session for 80 girls and young women at the *Maison des jeunes*. Participants viewed *Les fleurs du mal*, a television documentary produced by the Moroccan television station 2M on prostitution in Casablanca. The viewing was followed by a discussion among the participants about the documentary, focusing on the human rights of girls and young women to be free from sexual abuse and forced labor, and the distribution of selected human rights conventions. Afterwards, a representative from the *Association marocaine pour la lutte contre le SIDA* spoke about sexually transmitted diseases and the human right to health.
- **March 8:** Ms. Oulami attended the Marrakech production of “Al Moghtassaboun,” organized in collaboration with *Association Amal pour la femme et le développement* (El Hajeb) and *Association al Hadaf* (El Hajeb). She also assisted the Law Group Morocco team preparing materials for our information booth at the theatre.
- **March 14: “Awareness Caravan”:** Ms. Oulami established a network with *ALCS/Marrakech*, *la Comité des Droits de l’Homme*, *Association Afoulki pour la femme*, *Association N’fes*, et *Association Ennakhil pour la femme et l’enfant*, to organize an “Awareness Caravan” on the human rights of girls and young women at risk. She developed posters, brochures, T-shirts, press kits, and mini-booklets of relevant international human rights conventions in Arabic for distribution “on the road”. Ten representatives from the member organizations participated in each Caravan outreach trip.

Outreach in Sidi Bouateman (33 km from Marrakech): Ms. Oulami and members of the other five coordinating organizations held two workshops for students at the College Sidi Bouateman. Ms. Oulami facilitated a workshop for 45 high school girls on the human rights of girls and young women, and led a discussion among the participants of human rights violations faced by girls and young women in the region including sexual harassment, rape and polygamy. The ALCS led a workshop for 60 students on sexually transmitted diseases.

Outreach in Oulad Hassoune (17 km from Marrakech): In collaboration with *Association Oulad Hassoune*, Ms. Oulami and the ALCS facilitated a presentation and discussion on sexually transmitted diseases and women’s human right to health for 220 high school students.

- **March 15: “Awareness Caravan”:** The Caravan traveled to Ait Ourir (35 km from Marrakech) where, in collaboration with *Association Tasghrimoute*, they facilitated a presentation and discussion on girls and young women at risk for 92 girls and women at the *Maison de la jeunesse*. Caravan participants made presentations on the definition of girls and young women at risk, prostitution and sexual exploitation, forced labor of girls in domestic service (in the Amazigh language), Moroccan laws, international human rights laws protecting the human rights of girls and young women, and sexually transmitted diseases and women’s human right to health.
- **March 16: “Awareness Caravan”:** The Caravan traveled to Tasltante (10 km from Marrakech) where, in collaboration with *Association Tasltant*, Ms. Oulami conducted a presentation and discussion of *Les fleurs du mal*, a television documentary produced by the Moroccan television station 2M on prostitution in Casablanca, for 80 girls and

young women at the *College Echati*. Other participants made presentations on forced labor of young girls in domestic service and the human right to health.

The Caravan then traveled to Douar Edchira (30 km from Marrakech) where Ms. Oulami facilitated a workshop for 36 participants on the human rights of girls and young women, and led a discussion among the participants of human rights violations faced by girls and young women in the region (translated into Amazigh by another Caravan participant). The ALCS led a workshop on sexually transmitted diseases.

- **March 17: “Awareness Caravan”**: The Caravan traveled to a farm in El Hamid (7 km from Marrakech) where, in collaboration with the *Association des artisans*, they facilitated presentations and discussions on girls and young women at risk for a group of 120 girls and young women. Caravan participants made presentations on the definition of girls and young women at risk, prostitution and sexual exploitation, forced labor of girls in domestic service (in the Amazigh language), Moroccan laws, international human rights laws protecting the human rights of girls and young women, and sexually transmitted diseases and women’s human right to health.
- **March 19: “Awareness Caravan”**: The Caravan traveled to Tamellalt (53 km from Marrakech) where, in collaboration with the *College Sidi Bouateman*, they organized an exposition of books on women’s human rights and a competition for the best essay on women’s rights written by the students. Ms. Oulami facilitated a workshop for 40 girls and young women on the human rights of girls and young women at risk of sexual abuse, forced labor and trafficking in prostitution and domestic service. A professor at the school made a presentation on human rights in general, and the ALCS made a presentation on sexually transmitted diseases and women’s human right to health.
- **March 28: “Awareness Caravan”**: The Caravan traveled to Douar Tinssekt (78 km from Marrakech). Ms. Oulami facilitated a workshop for 58 participants on the human rights of girls and young women, and led a discussion among the participants of human rights violations faced by girls and young women in the region (translated into Amazigh by another Caravan participant). The ALCS led a workshop on sexually transmitted diseases.
- **March 29: Theatre piece**: Ms. Oulami, in collaboration with *Association Amal pour la femme et le développement* (El Hajeb) and *Association al Hadaf* (El Hajeb), presented the play “Al Moghtassaboun” (“The Rapists”) at the *Delegation culturelle* theatre in Marrakech. The play was attended by 170 people.
- **March 31: Open House for Resource Book**: Ms. Oulami organized a presentation and distribution of *Empowering Girls and Young Women at Risk*, the resource publication developed by the Law Group Morocco team and Working Group members. The event was attended by 19 representatives of 16 local organizations and high schools.

Tetouan

Association de recherché feminine pour le développement et la cooperation (ARFEDEC) implemented the following activities during the Month of Awareness:

- **March 7: Human Rights Education Session:** Members of ARFEDEC facilitated a human rights education session for a group of 30 girls and young women at risk beneficiaries of ARFEDEC. The participants viewed *L'histoire de Khadija Bahi*, a television documentary produced by the Moroccan television station 2M on trafficking into forced prostitution in El Hajeb. The viewing was followed by a presentation and discussion on women's human rights, violence against women, and the causes and consequences of prostitution in Morocco.
- **March 8:** Members of ARFEDEC attended the presentation of the theatre piece "Al Moghtassaboun," organized in collaboration with *Association Amal pour la femme et le développement* (El Hajeb) and *Association al Hadaf* (El Hajeb).
- **March 11: Human Rights Education Session:** Members of ARFEDEC facilitated a human rights education session for a group of 20 girls and young women beneficiaries of *Association Action Cultural* in M'diq. The participants viewed *L'histoire de Khadija Bahi*, a television documentary produced by the Moroccan television station 2M on trafficking into forced prostitution in El Hajeb. The viewing was followed by a presentation and discussion on women's human rights, violence against women, and the causes and consequences of prostitution in Morocco.
- **March 12:** Members of ARFEDEC facilitated a presentation and discussion on prostitution in Morocco and women's human rights for 40 students ages 18-25 at the *Nadi Nisswi* professional training center. This included the distribution and discussion of the Saida Menebhi article "Article interrompu sur les prostituées au maroc."
- **March 15: Theatre piece:** ARFEDEC, in collaboration with *Association Amal pour la femme et le développement* (El Hajeb) and *Association al Hadaf* (El Hajeb) presented the theatre piece "Al Moghtassaboun" ("The Rapists") at the *Maison de la jeunesse* in Tetouan. The play was attended by 450 people.

Agadir

Association Oum el Banine implemented the following program activities during the Month of Awareness:

- **March 1 – 5: Open House Days:** Hundreds of members of local organizations and potential women beneficiaries attended presentations of *Oum el Banine's* programs to promote the human rights of girls and young women, viewings of the *Law Group* website, distribution of relevant human rights conventions in Arabic, and presentations and discussions of *L'histoire de Khadija Bahi*, a television documentary produced by the Moroccan television station 2M on trafficking into forced prostitution in El Hajeb.
- **March 1: Workshops:** *Oum el Banine* organized and facilitated an awareness-raising workshop for 7 groups (12 participants per group). Following the presentation of *Oum el Banine's* programs to promote the human rights of girls and young women, viewings of the *Law Group* website, distribution of relevant human rights conventions in Arabic, and presentation and discussions of *L'histoire de Khadija Bahi*, participants worked in small groups to read and discuss 5 case studies of girls and young women at risk and conduct a human rights analysis of each case.
- **March 2: Legal orientation for Single Mothers:** *Oum el Banine* organized and facilitated a legal orientation session for a group of 98 single mother beneficiaries. Following the presentation of *Oum el Banine's* programs to promote the human rights of girls and young women, and distribution of relevant human rights conventions in Arabic, representatives of *Oum el Banine* and local lawyers made a presentation on the legal status of single mothers under Moroccan law and held an open question and answer period with the beneficiaries.
- **March 8:** Members of *Oum el Banine* attended the presentation of “Al Moghtassaboun,” organized in collaboration with *Association Amal pour la femme et le développement* (El Hajeb) and *Association al Hadaf* (El Hajeb).
- **March 14: Human Rights Education Session:** Members of *Oum el Banine* facilitated a human rights education session for a group of 76 girls and young women beneficiaries. The participants viewed *L'histoire de Khadija Bahi*, a television documentary produced by the Moroccan television station 2M on trafficking into forced prostitution in El Hajeb. The viewing was followed by a presentation and discussion on women's human rights, violence against women, and the causes and consequences of prostitution in Morocco.
- **March 15: Regional Planning Day:** *Oum el Banine* organized and facilitated a planning day for 25 representatives of 9 local organizations to develop a regional strategy for local organizations for integrating human rights programs focused on girls and young women at risk into their current activities.
- **March 22: Rural Outreach:** *Oum el Banine* presented the girls and young women at risk program of the Law Group and our local partners to a group of representatives from schools in Tiorar (Amsekroud region). Among the 21 people who participated in this meeting were school directors, teachers, high school students, and members of local development associations.
- **March 22: Rural Outreach:** *Oum el Banine* presented the girls and young women at risk program of the Law Group and our local partners to the *Association Oulad Mimoun* in Sidi Bibi, attended by 62 women beneficiaries of the association's vocational training program.

- **March 31: Open House for Resource Book:** *Oum el Banine* organized a presentation and distribution of *Empowering Girls and Young Women at Risk*. The event was attended by representatives of 12 local organizations.

C. Publishing the Education and Advocacy Manual, “Empowering Girls and Young Women at Risk in Morocco”

A central component of the Campaign was the collective drafting, production and distribution of the first-ever resource publication on empowering girls and young women at risk in Morocco. In January and February 2003, the Law Group Morocco team and Working Group members conducted fieldwork, outreach, interviews and research to create the components of the resource publication as planned in the December 2002 strategy meeting.

The Law Group Morocco team collected and edited materials contributed by Working Group members, and coordinated the publication and distribution of *Empowering Girls and Young Women at Risk in Morocco*. Many of the international human rights materials included in this publication were developed by Ann D. Jordan, Director of the Law Groups Initiative Against Trafficking Persons. Illustrations for the publication were contributed by *Association Amal pour la femme et le développement* (El Hajeb) and a girl-at-risk client of one of the Working Group partner organizations.

The 375-page *Empowering Girls and Young Women at Risk in Morocco* is the first resource publication designed for applying a human rights approach to awareness-raising activities, direct service provision, and advocacy on behalf of girls and young women at risk of sexual abuse, forced labor and human trafficking in prostitution and domestic service in Morocco. The publication also targets journalists, lawyers, social workers, researchers, and other actors interested in supporting the human rights of this vulnerable and underserved population. Content includes:

- A description of the phenomenon of girls and young women at risk supported by case studies from a variety of sites across Morocco;
- A collection of news articles by local media that are relevant to girls and young women at risk;
- A practical guide to support programs for girls and young women at risk from a human rights based approach, including fieldwork, outreach and communication strategies, psycho-social assistance, legal advice, and other practical assistance;
- The national legal framework and international human rights law relevant to protecting the rights of girls and young women at risk;
- Human rights education curriculum for girls and young women at risk and the general public;
- Analysis and strategy planning curriculum for NGOs; and
- Additional information such as Internet resources, a directory of international NGOs working on similar issues to their Moroccan counterparts, bibliographies, and practical fact-sheets and case management forms.

For detailed information about content and structure, please see the attached English Executive Summary of the publication. More than 250 copies of *Empowering Girls and Young Women at Risk in Morocco* have been distributed to local NGOs and LDAs across Morocco.

III. MEDIA COVERAGE OF THE CAMPAIGN AND PUBLICATION

The Month of Awareness and *Empowering Girls and Young Women at Risk in Morocco* received extensive coverage in the local media outlets between March and May 2003 including feature articles in:

In addition, Law Group Liaison Halima Oulami (Marrakech) was interviewed on the local Marrakech radio station about the Month of Awareness on March 20, 2003. The Director of Law Group partner organization *Oum el Banine*, Madame Mahjouba Eddbouche, described the Month of Awareness campaign during a program aired by the local Agadir radio station. She and facilitated the participation of two women from Agadir who spoke about the challenges they face as single mothers.

IV. PROGRAM MATERIALS

1. *Empowering Girls and Young Women at Risk in Morocco: A Resource Book on Sexual Abuse, Forced Labor and Human Trafficking in Prostitution and Domestic Service* (in Arabic)
